We are told that we will have to double our national investment in education, at a cost of some \$20 billion.

Where does Boone Junior College fit in all of this?

These are questions and problems I ponder, but I feel that as long as we raise the above questions and work on resolving them, our educational system will continue to serve the American goal—"Every individual, regardless of race, creed, color, or national origin, shall have the opportunity to develop his or her best self, to continue appropriate education up to his or her personal point of optimum development."—from First Interim Report to the President, the President's Committee on Education Beyond High School.

As long as we do not forsake our humanistic goals for purely technical goals, Boone Junior College will serve her community and nation well.

#### Enrollment Up 6%

This fall Boone Junior College has a 6% increase in enrollment over last year. In the past eight years the enrollment has more than doubled with the largest enrollment being in 1958, with a total of 142 students. The present enrollment is 132 students.

Boone J. C. could also be called a 'melting pot.' Although almost half of the student body graduated from the Boone Public Schools, there are students attending from Germany, Hawaii, Minnesota, and Utah, as well as transfer students from El Camino College, California; Graceland College, Lamoni, Iowa; Rockford, Illinois; State University of Iowa, Iowa City; Trinity, Chicago, Illinois; and the University of Nevada, Reno.

Liberal Arts curriculum enrolled 25 women and 49 men in the freshman class and nine women and 26 men in the sophomore class. Preengineering has 12 freshmen and one sophomore. Special students, those enrolled for less than 12 semester hours, consists of five women and eight men.

## Librarian Added to B. J. C. Staff

Mrs. Clark, half-time librarian, was added to the staff this year because of the increased demand for the use of the library. New books, magazines, and library tools will appear on the shelves. A new file, book truck, and typewriter, custom made for library work, will accompany the new office which has been added.

Mrs. Clark announced two new magazines will be available for the students' use, *Current* and *ETC*. Eighty new books will appear in the field of physical science, social science, education, philosophy, and communications

A two-year book of Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature, which is bigger and contains more magazines, replaces the booklet covering a three-month period. New, also, are an Encyclopedia of Religion, Intelligent Man's Guide to Science, Dictionary of Occupational Titles, Encyclopedia of Science and Technology, French readers, and a French dictionary.

A no-fine policy on books checked out for two weeks has been adopted this year to encourage more people to use the library. Names will be posted monthly of over-due books. Names appearing too often will have the privilege to use the library revoked.

Future improvements of the library will be the conversion of part of the office to a magazine shelf where the back issues of magazines will be filed so students can easily find them.
