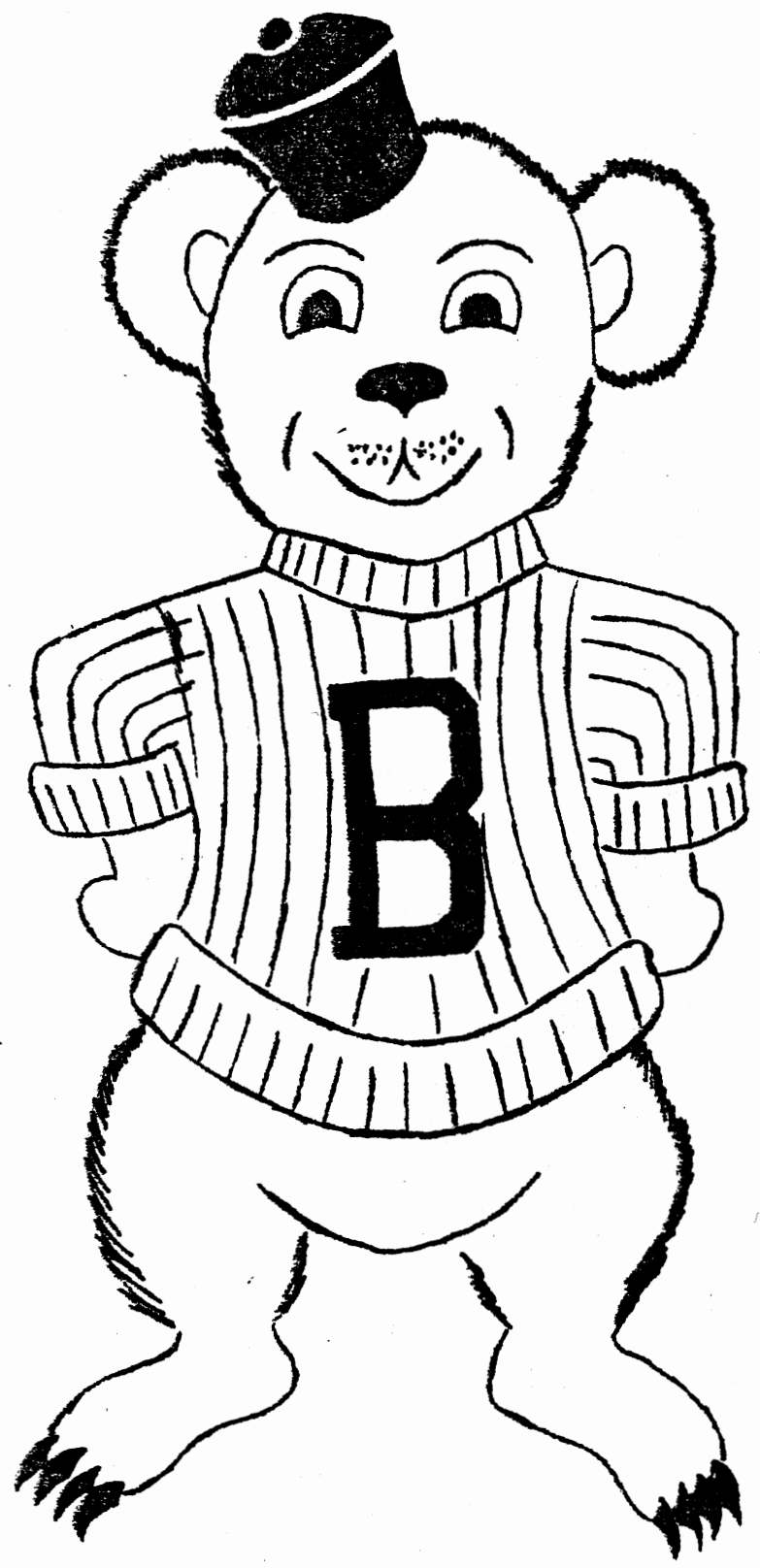

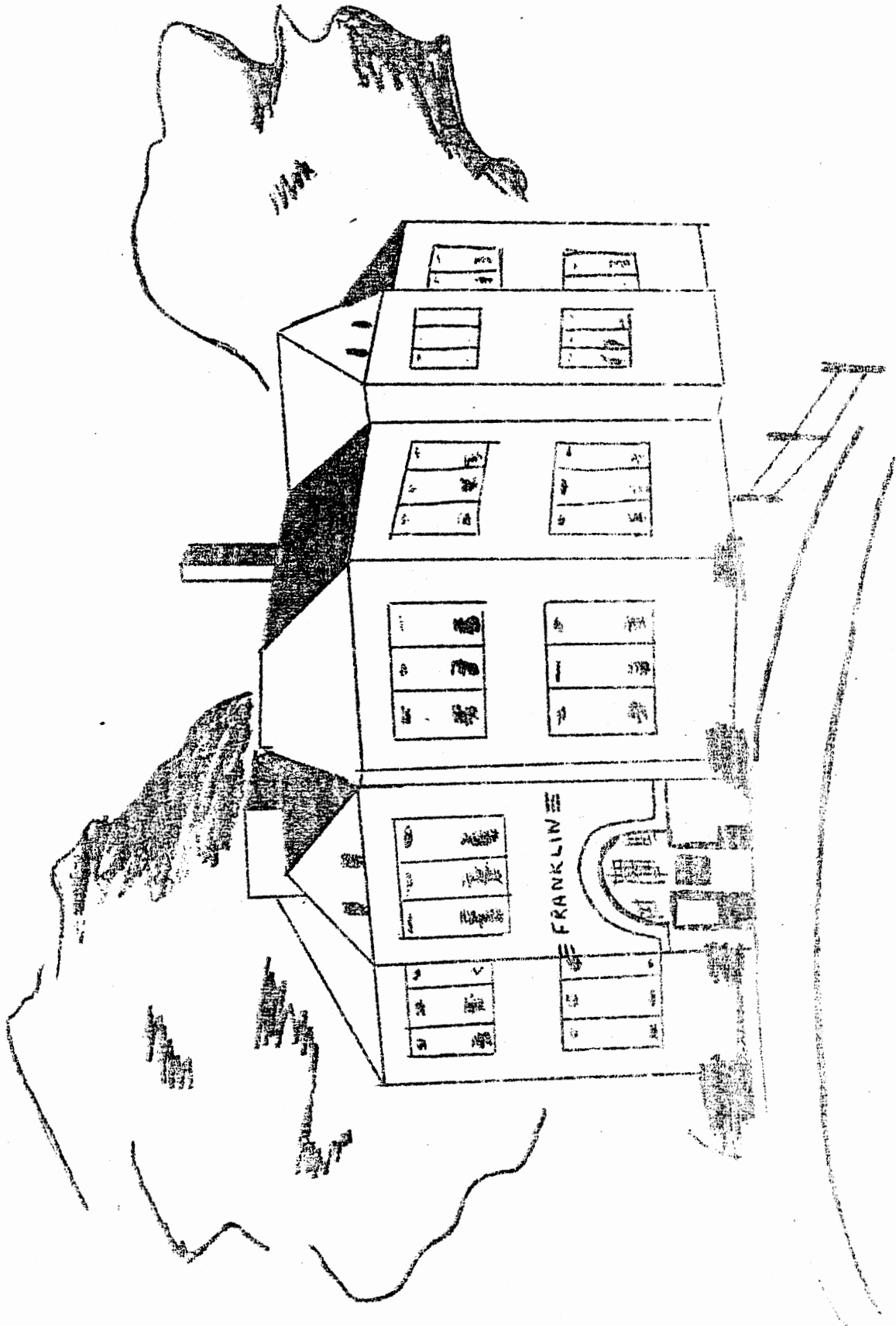

TEACHER FEATURE

Mr. Clair Abbott, Dean of Students at Boone Junior College, has been one of the central figures in the promotion of the new Junior College. Upon interviewing him about the new facilities, we felt that first it was important to view his personal life and to see how well he has prepared himself for this high position as Dean of Students.

Mr. Abbott graduated from Vail High School which is now the Ar-No-Va school system. He then attended business school at the American School of Commerce in Omaha, Nebraska. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Buena Vista in Storm Lake, his Master of Science from Iowa State University in Ames and has done graduate work at the University of Iowa in Iowa City, Drake University in Des Moines and Iowa State University. His undergraduate majors were history and sociology and he has a masters major in school administration and a masters major compiled in sociology.

Dean Abbott also served three years overseas in India and Pakistan in World War II.

Before beginning to teach, Dean Abbott was in social welfare work for three years. He then taught three years at Storm Lake, one year at Ames, ten years in administration at Boone High School, and is now in his third year at Boone Junior College.

He and his wife, Grace, have two children, Jean, who is 14 and married, living in Ozark, Alabama, and Davey, who is 19 and a student at Boone Junior College.

Due to much of Dean Abbott's encouragement and hard work, the school bond issue for the new Junior College has been passed. It will no doubt result in continued growth of Boone Junior College and an expansion of school curriculum. Two years from now, the new college will be more than just architectural plans--it will be a reality, ready for use.

All of the students would like to take this opportunity to extend their appreciation to Dean Abbott for what he has done for the present Junior College and for what he is doing for the future Junior College.

The cast has enjoyed working together on the play and hope it will be a great success.

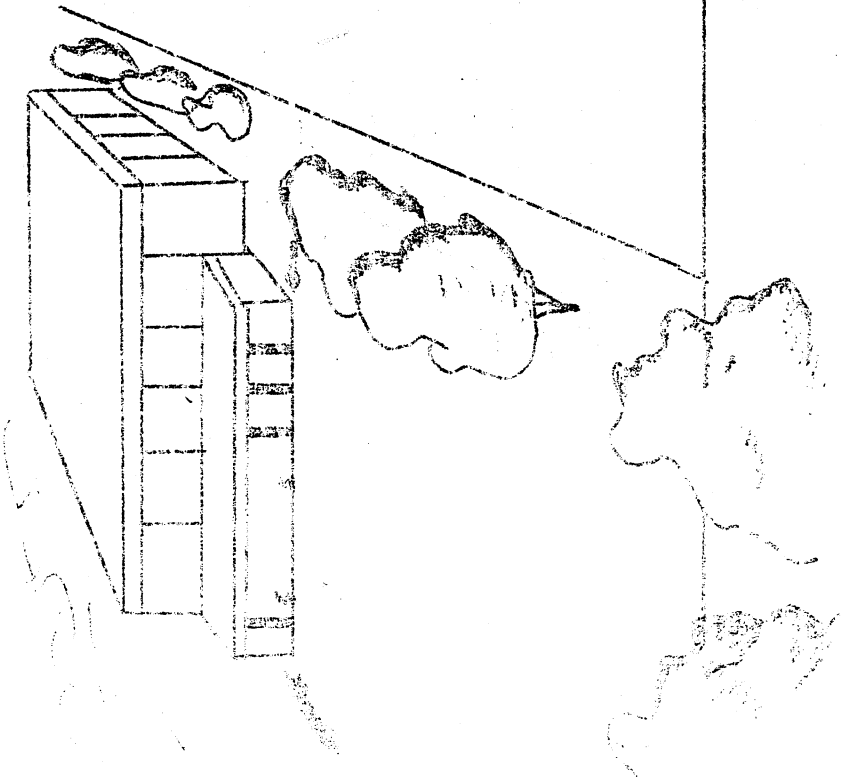
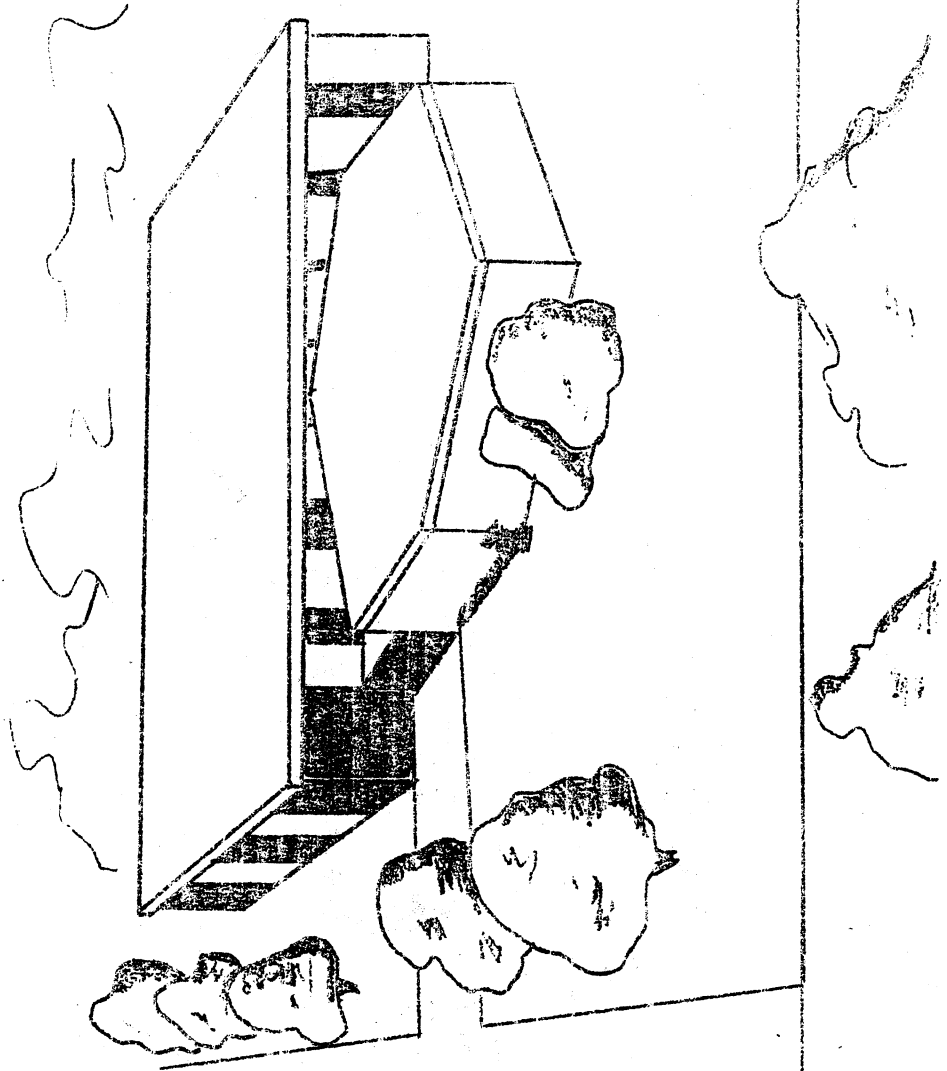
