High rise dorms for DMACC

A \$400 million contract has been negotiated and finalized with Condos, Inc., the company in charge of constructing four high-rise dormitory buildings for Boone Campus students.

The new dorms, which will be located west of Boone Campus, will house 800 students.

Preliminary floor plans show each building will be comprised of 10 floors for living quarters. Each floor will have five units designed to house four students per unit.

Each unit will have two bedrooms, two bathrooms with sunken, heart-shaped bathtubs, a complete modern kitchen, living room, study, and a sundeck. Each unit will also be completely furnished.

The first floor of each dormitory will have the usual assortment of entertainment devices: video games, pool tables, Ping-Pong, movie theater — just to name a few.

Maid service will be provided twice a week. Laundry will be picked up each Wednesday and returned Thursday. These services will be provided because it is the belief of the DMACC-Boone Campus board of directors that a student's time could be better devoted to studying if household chores were not a concern to the student.

The construction is due to be completed in the spring of 1990.

Kay finds her true love



Nuclear protest at Boone Campus

The scene at DMACC - Boone Campus Monday, March 28, echoed life on a college campus in the 1960s. Student activists and staff members staged a die-in to protest the proliferation of nuclear weapons.

The die-in (a form of protest in which the condition of death is acted out) lasted 15 minutes, beginning at noon.

The event was primarily organized by Jeff Boucher. Boucher, a sophomore at DMACC, says he got the idea after watching a similar protest during last year's VEISHA festivities at Iowa State University, Ames.

DMACC is not traditionally known for its political activities, but that is something Boucher and others hope to change.

"America had an incredible arms buildup during Reagan's presidency. This, of course, is detrimental to human life; hopefully, through protests like this, we can cause some people to think about their position on the peace issue," Boucher said.

Boucher and the other student activists have formed a political action group called The DMACC Coalition for Sane Action.

The group is planning a spring walk for peace. A date and time have not been set.



An Oscar for Mueller



What appeared to be a regular spring play production has come to be a living nightmare. The play, "A Turn for the Nurse," has taken an eerie turn for the worse!

the building for practice. Remembering that she had left her script in the car, Rhodd ran back to get it. When she hadn't returned 15 minutes later, Bernice went to the parking lot only to find a yellow rose and skid marks in the parking space.

March 17, 3:20 p.m. - Rose is practicing lines with Porter while the others looked for Mary. Without notice, he is gone, the yellow rose in his place.

March 18, 4:10 p.m. - Tilley and Lingren are discussing lines backstage; the rest of the

cast is up front reporting information to the BMT.

A loud noise is heard. Thinking that one of the flats has fallen, cast member Scott Farris runs back to assist, only to return with two yellow roses in his hand.

What does the yellow rose mean? Where are the four MT's? These are all unanswered questions. If you have any information regarding this case, please notify director Mueller at once.

"It's terrible, just terrible," was the only comment the distraught Mueller could make.
